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generally starts with pain medication and advice. Your doctor will likely tell you to remain active but modify it down to accommodate your pain. Over-the-counter (OTC) or prescription pain medications are usually tried first, and your doctor will instruct you on how to take care of your back.

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## **Acute Low Back Pain Symptoms, Causes, and Treatment**

Acute pain has been defined as "the physiologic response and experience to noxious stimuli that can become pathologic, is normally sudden in onset, time limited, and motivates behaviors to avoid actual or potential tissue injuries." Acute pain usually lasts for less than 7

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days but often extends up to 30 days; for some conditions, acute pain episodes may recur periodically.

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but usually fades over a relatively short period of time or with treatment.
